Language Arts:

We are reading stories from the 4th Unit of our Pearson/Reading Street series. This week, we are reading expository or informational text, which tells about real people, places, events, or things. It uses details to explain the subject. While reading Life Cycle of a Pumpkin, by Ron Fridell and Patricia Walsh, students were asked to look for facts and details about the life cycle of a pumpkin. We also learned the important role that sequence can play in understanding a text. Our phonics/spelling pattern this week was words spelled with oo or u that have the same sound as the word 'put'.

Neither did we, but we are deep in research trying to find out as much as we can about the honeybee – why it's important, why it's in danger, and how we can help!

Science:

We are in our final science unit of the year, *Interactions of Living Things*. The main concept of this unit will be, "What do living things need?" We will explore three essential questions:

- How do organisms live, grow, and respond to their environment?
- How and why do organisms interact with their environment and what are the effects of these interactions?
- What happens when the needs of plants and animals are not met?
 The first task given to the children was to plan and conduct an investigation to determine if plants need sunlight and water to grow.

Math:

We did lots of data collection and graphing this week. The students made bar and picture graphs based on "would you rather...." questions answered by their peers. In addition to making graphs, the second graders answered put together, take apart, and probability questions based on the data. Next week students will be assessed on these measurement and data standards. In addition we will do some work reading and comparing temperatures on a thermometer.
