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Reading Language Arts

In our reading this week we were looking to answer the question, *Why is working together a good idea*? The children developed an understanding of this idea as we read the drama/fairy tale, <u>The Bremen</u> <u>Town Musicians.</u> Through this story, we also practiced identifying *cause-effect* relationships. We explored this further while enjoying Jan Brett's story, <u>The Wild Christmas Reindeer</u>.

Our phonics/spelling focus this week was plurals adding –s or –es. We also looked at words that change spelling (i.e. leaf = leaves; mouse = mice). The students are learning to write in argumentative (persuasive) mode. Next week the children will write about the character traits they each possess that would make them a good reindeer trainer! We will carry over our skills from this week into next week, and the students will take the Unit 2 Week 4 test next week.

*We used Kahoot this week as a way to review for our Native Americans of Illinois assessment & Geometry assessment. Kahoot was a big hit with the second graders.

Problem-Based Learning

We answered the question, What if the reindeer couldn't pull Santa's sleigh? Ask your child what animal he/she decided on as a replacement and why. We used the Chatter Kids app to present our information. Many of the children were able to finish their projects and upload them to their Seesaw portfolio.

Math

During our new unit (fractions/partitioning) we will cover the following standards.

*Partition a rectangle into rows and columns of samesize squares and count to find the total number of them.

*Partition circles and rectangles into two, three, or four equal shares, describe the shares using the words halves, thirds, half of, a third of, etc., and describe the whole as two halves, three thirds, four fourths. Recognize that equal shares of identical wholes need not have the same shape.

This week we started with the basics – recognizing how many parts it takes to make a whole and naming the equal parts. We started reading and writing fractions in both word (halves, thirds) and number (1/4, 2/3) form.



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
